

BAPTISM

The Greek word for Baptism (baptizein) means to plunge, sink, to be immersed.

Purity in Jesus' day was wildly popular. People went along to the local baths before going to the temple for sacrifices or festivals. Some groups said the act of washing cleansed the soul, others said repentance cleansed the soul and you washed afterwards as a sign of what's just happened. Certain people weren't allowed near the temple, which meant they couldn't take part with sacrifices or ritual washing: they couldn't experience the forgiveness of God. This included tax collectors, prostitutes, soldiers (as they were almost always Gentiles), people who were mentally unwell and Samaritans.

And then we find John the Baptist. He talks like a priest and baptizes people like a priest, but he's doing it in the wrong place, and he's offering it to the wrong people. He's baptising tax collectors, prostitutes and soldiers out in the desert, not a temple in sight. The people couldn't come to God; John brought God to the people. John offered a once-and-for-all baptism. You weren't just washing away your wrongs. Instead it was a burial of your old life and the beginning of a new life. Even Jesus, who was sinless, got baptised as he was about to take on the sin of the world. Jesus and John (and possibly the crowd around them) heard God declare all around him that Jesus is indeed his son, the one that will bring justice to the nations (Mark

1:11, Luke 3:22, quoting Isaiah 42:1).

We experience God in a new way after baptism. There's something about the act of baptism - and the faith required to ask for it - that deepens our relationship with God.

Jesus and Baptism

Matthew 3:13-17

13 Then Jesus went from Galilee to the Jordan River to be baptized by John. 14 But John tried to talk him out of it. "I am the one who needs to be baptized by you," he said, "so why are you coming to me?"

15 But Jesus said, "It should be done, for we must carry out all that God requires." So John agreed to baptize him. 16 After his baptism, as Jesus came up out of the water, the heavens were opened and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and settling on him. 17 And a voice from heaven said, "This is my dearly loved Son, who brings me great joy."
